Behind the Scenes...

A small working group* has been meeting since January to ensure that residents have the opportunity to be fully informed about the more significant Warrant Articles that will be presented at this year's Annual Town Meeting to be held on Monday May 1st.

Communications

A Warrant Article Sponsor's meeting was held to review roles and responsibilities, meeting protocols and provide a Q & A opportunity for all.

Warrant Article Sponsor's Responsibilities

- The working group reiterated their strong recommendation for sponsors to communicate broadly with residents using communication tools such as the Town's website, social media, and email.
- Frequent outreach which summarizes and explains the warrant article, the reason for it and the benefits of the article will go a long way to ensuring a successful, efficient Town Meeting.

The Warrant Committee held their Open Hearing on March 13.

At the Hearing, sponsors of the various articles summarized their proposals and residents had the opportunity to comment on these and ask questions in advance of Town Meeting. A financial overview of the operating and capital budget was provided at the hearing and has since been updated with more current information.

The Warrant Committee's evaluation of the articles will be posted on the Town Meeting webpage before Town Meeting and also mailed to all households ("the Blue Book"). Click [here](#) for the Town Meeting webpage.

Dover Community Center - Subcontractor bids were due by March 29 and the General Contractor bids are due by April 19. Once these are received, they will be assessed by the Caryl Building Committee, leading to a recommendation to the Board of Selectmen of the lowest bid qualified contractor.

BOS Membership Size - The Committee held its second meeting on March 15 and discussed the types of information they might need to make an informed judgment on membership size. They also discussed options for a consultant and what qualities should be considered when selecting "like towns" for comparison purposes. Their goal is to have a good foundation of knowledge about how Dover works to facilitate the assessment/comparison of data expected to be gathered.

Well Regulations

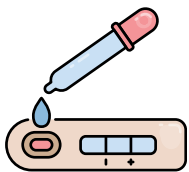

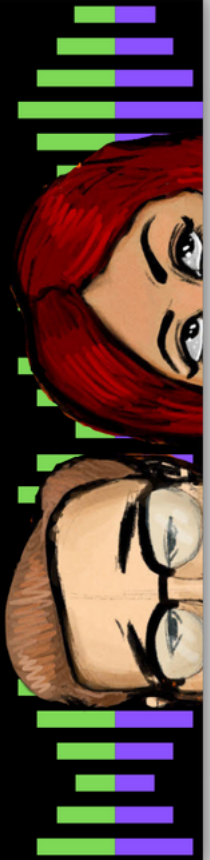

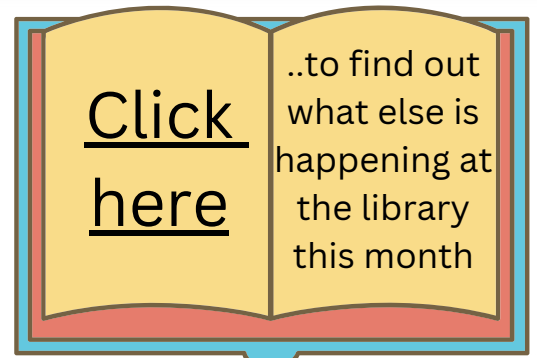

Recycling Committee

April is Spring Clean-up Month for Dover's streets and parks.

The Dover Recycling Committee, in conjunction with the Highway Department, is planning the annual Dover Clean-Up for the entire month of April. This community event promotes street and property clean up.

In 2022, 400 town residents participated in this effort. This year's goal is to once again have 100% of the 159 streets and many parks cleaned up. All Dover residents are invited to help achieve this goal by signing up for a street that is important to you. All local clubs and organizations are encouraged to join in the cleanup. Help with a section of our main through streets where roadside trash is greatest and consider checking it all year round.

The condition of most bottles and cans makes them unacceptable at recycling centers so it is not necessary to separate trash from recyclables. The Recycling Committee will supply bags and arrange for street safety signs to be posted.

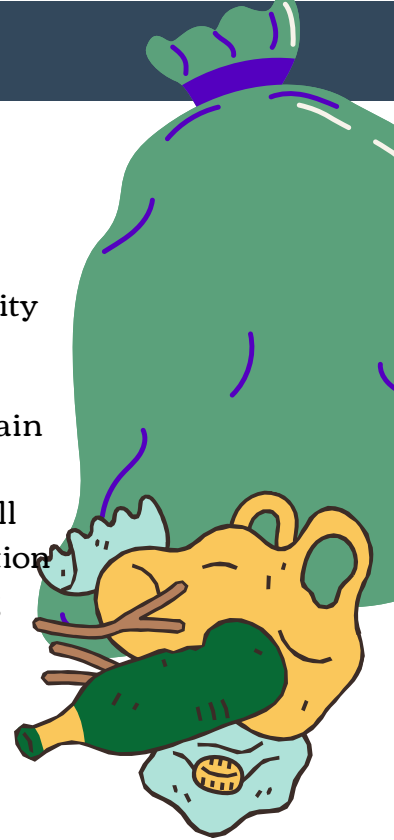

Dover Encourages Participation in Food Waste Diversion

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection estimates that food waste accounts for more than 25 percent of the waste stream after recycling. Food waste should be separated from trash to keep it from being incinerated or clogging landfills, both of which produce harmful chemicals and contribute to air pollution. Diversion of food waste enhances the operation and increases the longevity of all septic systems.

What is Dover doing about it? Dover's Transfer Station collects food waste which is then transported to an anaerobic digester for conversion to biogas, a renewable energy source. This program benefits the environment by turning waste into a resource. In 2022, the town collected 1000 tons of trash at the Transfer Station but only 30 tons of food waste, a decrease from previous years.

What can you do? Separate your food waste from trash and dispose of it in the large barrels located next to the compost area at the Transfer Station. This includes bones, shells, corn cobs, tea bags, coffee grounds, and all meats, eggs, and fish. Items that are NOT acceptable are recyclables, cooking oil, yard waste, boxes, cups and cartons. All food must be bagged. You can use any type of bag - plastic, paper or compostable. The use of compostable bags is recommended. Kitchen countertop containers are available for purchase at the Town Garage.



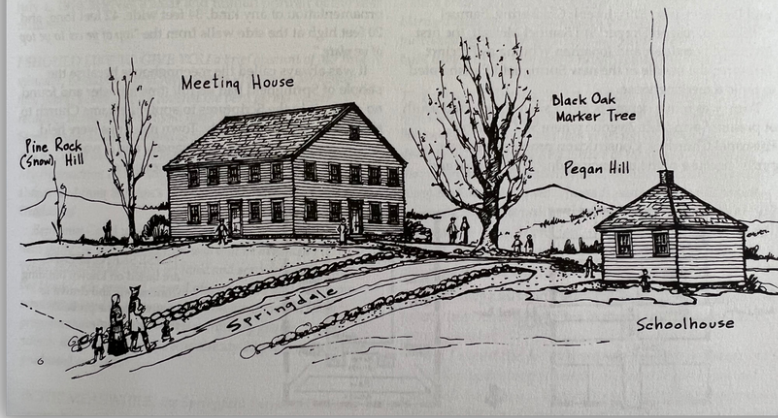

Town Meetings

Town Meetings have been run in this country for over 300 years and still continue today. In 1754 the Town Meeting was held in Dover's first Meeting House on Meeting House Hill (where St Dunstan's Episcopal Church is now). The Meeting House was a gathering place for many public occasions including Town Meetings and religious observances. In 1810 this building burned to the ground and a second Meeting House was built to replace it across the street on the site where The Dover Church is now. This year our Town Meeting will take place on Monday May 1 at 7pm at Mudge Auditorium at the Dover Sherborn Regional School.

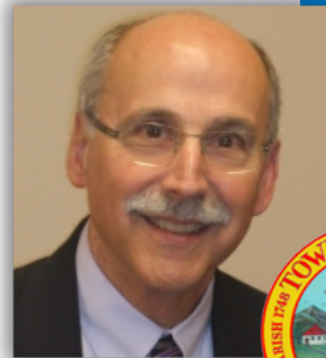
