

Dover Community Center Construction Update


There has been a lot of progress made on the community center since the last update. The structural steel has been completed and was celebrated with a topping off ceremony. Residents of the Town had the opportunity to sign a steel beam and watch it be lifted and installed. The completion of the structural steel is a major milestone as it allows for other work to begin, such as the building envelope and roof. In addition, with the new steel supporting the 1910 building, the temporary supports were removed and interior work, such as underground electrical and plumbing, as well as framing, could begin. The pavilion slab was also completed. Which was another important milestone. With the steel now complete, we should expect to see a lot more activity on site!

Town Election

Election Date: May 20, 2024

Polls open at 7:00 AM and close at 8:00 PM



Options for voting are: in person on Election Day (s); Vote by Mail; Absentee Vote; Early Vote.

1. Vote by Mail ballots can be obtained from the Town Clerk's office with a complete vote-by-mail application. For those who want to vote by mail, you can bring your ballots to the Town Clerk's Office, drop them in the drop box at 5 Springdale Avenue (silver box in the semicircle driveway on Springdale Avenue), or mail them through the post office.
2. Absentee Ballot - An absentee ballot is essentially the same as voting by mail, with the exception that you can come and vote an absentee ballot in person at the Town Clerk's office, during office hours, as soon as ballots are available.
3. Early Voting in Person at the Dover Town House, in the Great Hall located at 5 Springdale Avenue on the following dates and times:

Monday, May 13 9:00AM - 3:00PM

Tuesday, May 14 9:00AM - 4:00PM

Wednesday, May 15 9:00AM - 3:00PM

Thursday, May 16 9:00AM - 4:00PM

Friday, May 17 9:00AM - 1:00PM



4. Vote in Person on May 20 at the Dover Town House, in the Great Hall, 5 Springdale Avenue. Polls open at 7:00 AM and close at 8:00 PM.

Department of Public Works

In April, the final construction work on Claybrook Road was successfully completed. The work included a thorough inspection of erosion controls to ensure the safety and stability of the road. Wetland topsoil was installed to improve drainage and prevent environmental damage. The road was paved with great attention to detail, ensuring a smooth and durable surface for drivers. The only remaining tasks are to plant vegetation for aesthetic improvement and to provide a natural habitat for local wildlife, as well as to stripe the road to ensure clear and visible markings for safe navigation. As a result, Claybrook Road is now fully paved, open, and ready for public use.



PROTECT YOURSELF FROM TICKS

HOW TO KEEP SAFE FROM TICKS:

- Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts.
- Tuck your pants into your socks.
- Use EPA-approved insect repellents.
- Avoid wooded areas, tall grass and leaf litter.
- Buy clothing treated with 0.5% permethrin, or use a permethrin treatment on clothing (apply to clothing not being worn and let dry).
- Check for ticks on clothing, pets, gear and these parts of your body: hair and scalp, ears, underarms, belly button, waist, between the legs and the back of the knees.
- Lawns should be well-maintained so backyards don't become tick hotspots.

TICK REMOVAL:

If you find a tick attached to your skin, removing it as soon as possible is important to reduce the risk of disease transmission. Removing black-legged ticks within 36 hours, even if the tick is infected with *Borrelia burgdorferi*, nearly eliminates your risk of contracting Lyme disease.

It is only recommended that you remove ticks mechanically using fine-tipped tweezers.

- Pull the skin taut to allow as much access to the tick mouthparts as possible.
- Grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. Avoid using blunt tweezers or your fingers, as this can increase the risk of tearing the tick and spreading any potential infection.
- Pull upwards with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick, as this can cause parts of the tick to break off and remain in the skin. If this happens, remove the mouthparts with tweezers. If you are unable to remove the mouth easily with clean tweezers, leave it alone and let the skin heal.
- Clean the bite area and your hands. After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.
- Dispose of the tick. Submerge the live tick in alcohol, place it in a sealed bag/container, wrap it tightly in tape, or flush it down the toilet. Try to avoid crushing a tick with your fingers.
- Avoid "Alternative" removal options. DO NOT use nail polish, petroleum jelly, or heat to make the tick detach from the skin. These methods are not effective and may increase the likelihood of transmitting a pathogen to the host.

If bitten by a tick, monitor the bite site for signs of Lyme disease or other illnesses over the next few weeks. Talk to a healthcare provider about preventative doxycycline and seek medical advice if symptoms develop, based on tick type, location, and local prevalence of tick-borne illnesses.

The Mediterranean Sea contains hundreds of thousands of ancient shipwrecks from warships from naval battles to merchantmen that sank due to adverse weather conditions. The lecturer, underwater archaeologist Helena (Laina) Wylde Swiny, will tell the story of one of the ancient cargo ships, the late 4th-early 3rd century BC Kyrenia Ship that sank off the north coast of Cyprus ca. 295 BC. 

Dover Special Recycling Day May 11

The Dover Recycling Committee announces its spring special recycling day on Saturday, May 11 for shredding, special collections of bikes, wheeled suitcases, back packs, duffel bags, paper and plastic reusable shopping bags for charity organizations and up to 8 tires per household for disposal.



Document Shredding

On-site document enhanced shredding is being provided by Norfolk District Attorney Michael Morrissey with the financial support of Jay Hughes and John Hughes of Dover Country Properties. "Safely destroying old financial documents, bank statements and sensitive papers is an important guard against identity theft," said DA Morrissey. An industrial-grade shredding truck will be on site on Saturday from 9AM-12PM. Dover residents may bring up to 6 paper bags of personal/sensitive documents.

Open Space Committee

2nd Saturday Stroll in Hale

Please join us for a guided walk, sponsored by the Dover Open Space Committee (OSC) in partnership with the Dover Historical Society (DHS). On May 11th, we will walk through Hale. We will sample a few of the over 20 miles of trails which are interconnected Dover's Larrabee Estate, Trustees of Reservations' Noanet Woodlands and Powisset Farm - a contiguous landscape of over 2300 acres of open space!



Guided by DHS experts, we will see several of the sites that indigenous peoples used, including where they quarried felsite for arrows and tools. We will also learn about the over 100-year history of Hale and its vision for the future, including protecting the land with a Conservation Restriction (CR).

Walks will not be too strenuous but will be over uneven and possibly wet ground so wear appropriate footwear and bring bug spray, sunscreen, walking sticks, binoculars and cameras. Polite dogs on leash welcome. We will stroll in misty rain to shine. Parking & meet-up information will be emailed to registered participants on Friday 5/10.

Exciting Updates from the Tree Preservation Committee: Tree City USA Status and Stormwater Management Bylaw

Spring has brought exciting developments for our Tree Preservation Committee, and we are thrilled to share them with you!

We are proud to announce that Dover has been awarded Tree City USA status, a testament to our community's commitment to preserving and enhancing our local forest. During the application process, our committee highlighted the hard work and dedication of our past and present residents who have contributed their resources and/or their time toward preserving community lands, retaining our rural feel, and nurturing a sustainable Dover community. Conservation Commission

The Importance of Protecting Pollinators and Reducing Pesticide Use


Pollinators like honeybees, butterflies and birds are hard at work providing vital but often unnoticed services. They pollinate a wide variety of crops including apples, bananas, blueberries, strawberries, melon, peaches, potatoes, vanilla, almonds, coffee and chocolate. You can help protect these vital pollinators in your yard and garden by reducing and eliminating the use of pesticides and herbicides and planting a diversity of native plants. You may have heard that many pollinators are disappearing due to pesticide and herbicide use, climate change, habitat loss, disease and increases in environmental contaminants that have all contributed to the decline of many species of pollinators. Pollinators that can't find the right quantity or quality of food (nectar and pollen from blooming plants within flight range) don't survive. Did you know that dandelions are the first food for bees emerging in the spring? Leave them in your yard and feed the bees! Dandelion petals and leaves are also edible and can be used in salads.

Three-fourths of the world's flowering plants and approximately 35 percent of the world's food crops depend on animal pollinators to reproduce. More than 3,500 species of native bees help increase crop yields. Some scientists estimate that one out of every three bites of food we eat exists because of pollinators.
