October Progress Update


With the buildings dried-in and windows installed and the interior insulation mostly complete, drywall installation has begun. This is a major milestone and marks the completion of the rough trades. At the exterior, brick masonry is well underway and anticipated to be completed within a couple of weeks. You can now get a sense of what the final project will look like on the outside. At the site, the two 30,000-gallon underground water storage tanks have been installed and are mostly backfilled. The project team is currently tracking substantial completion late January. This is when the building will be turned over to the Town and move in can begin. Final completion, when non-life safety items are completed, is anticipated late February.





Rail Trail Update

Overview:

The Town of Dover is excited to announce the proposed Rail Trail Construction Project. This initiative is focused on enhancing community connectivity and promoting outdoor recreation. The goal is to develop a recreational trail and shared-use pathway, providing residents with safer, healthier opportunities for outdoor activities and transportation.



Many town departments and committees have been working together to shape the project's scope and goals. As the project moves forward, we are committed to transparency and due diligence while actively seeking community input along the way.

Project Timeline:

Phase 1: Planning and Design (October 2024-April 2025)

The initial phase involves planning and design efforts to create the foundation for the trail project. The town will assemble a working group tasked with defining the project's scope and creating preliminary layouts. Once completed, the preliminary design will be shared with the community, allowing for feedback and suggestions before moving to the next phase.

Phase 2: Cost Estimation and Funding (Spring 2025)

In this phase, a detailed cost estimate will be prepared, covering construction, materials, labor and long-term maintenance. The town will explore funding options, including federal, state and local grants, as well as potential public-private partnerships. A finalized budget will be created to ensure the project is financially sustainable.

Phase 3: Final Planning and Approval (Fall 2025)

Once a comprehensive plan is developed and budget estimates are finalized, the project proposal will be presented to town meeting for approval. During this phase, residents will have another opportunity to review and provide feedback before construction begins.

Get Involved

The Town is seeking interested volunteers with experience related to the construction of similar rail trails in Massachusetts or knowledge of public construction projects. Transfer Station

DPW Will Issue New Stickers for the Town of Dover's Transfer Station

Located at 211 Powisset St. As of January 1st , 2025, every resident who utilizes the transfer station will be required to have the new sticker. As in the past, there is no fee associated with the new sticker. The application process can be done online or in person. If completed online you can skip the wait and have your sticker(s) mailed to your residence. To complete the application process online, please go to: <https://www.doverma.gov/184/Transfer- Station>. In-person applications can be completed at the town garage, located at 2 Dedham St. In Addition, the recycling committee will also be available the weekend of November 16 at the transfer station to help with stickers. To obtain a new transfer station sticker, you will need the following:

- Vehicle Registration
- Proof of Residency- may be substantiated with a valid driver's license, property tax bill, lease, utility bill, or other similar documentation.

New Bog Bridge in Wylde Woods!

Dover Conservation Commission and Open Space Committee are excited to announce that their joint subcommittee, the Land Management Working Group, built a new bog bridge over a large wetlands crossing in Wylde Woods this past summer! The bridge is a few minutes walk from the Centre Street turn out (map) in Wylde Woods along the blue trail.


The Land Management Working Group replaced an old bridge built and donated by local Boy Scouts many years ago. The previous bridge had suffered significant wear and tear over time, eventually requiring a new structure to take its place. This new bog bridge is built close to the standard design circulated by the US Forest Service and follows an example recommended by our friends at DLCT. The new bog bridge is somewhat smaller, reducing impact on the wetlands it spans, and uses materials that provide better traction for trail users.

Materials were purchased by the Conservation Commission, and donated by the Department of Public Works. Use of the tractor needed for demolition of the old bridge was kindly lent and operated by Jerry Arnold. The bridge was built by Greg Kahoun and Rick Nagy, and installed by Jon Sampson, Rick Nagy, Greg Kahoun, and Anna Nagy. Nevin Weinberg of Belvoir Tree Service provided a key service in transporting the bridge segments to the Wylde Woods entrance.

The Dover Board of Health has a few important updates to share:

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, New England District is hosting an open house on October 8, 2024, in Millis, Massachusetts, to revise the 1984 Charles River Natural Valley Storage Area (CRNVSA) Master Plan. The plan covers areas in Millis, Medfield, Norfolk, Franklin, Holliston, Needham, Sherborn, Bellingham, Dedham, Dover, Medway, Newton, Wrentham, Walpole, Natick, and Boston.




The open house will be held from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Millis Public Library Roche Bros. Community Room at 961 Main Street in Millis. The revision aims to address changes in regional land use, population, outdoor recreation trends, and USACE management policy. Key topics include updated land use classifications, new natural and recreational resource management objectives, and special issues such as invasive species management and threatened and endangered species habitat. Following the open house, a 30-day public comment period will begin on October 8 and end on November 9. 

Meet the Staff

Welcome Interim Fire Chief James Wright!

Chief Wright was recently appointed as the Interim Fire Chief of the Dover Fire Department. His journey in the fire service began in the mid-70s, accompanying his father, a call firefighter, on emergency calls. In 1984, at 19, he became a volunteer firefighter with the Amherst Fire Department while pursuing an Electrical Engineering degree. In May 1985, he joined the Air Force National Guard as a firefighter. Then in January 1990, he became a full-time civilian firefighter for the 104th Fighter Wing in Westfield while also serving as a call firefighter in Athol.

His experience leading fire departments came in March 1997, when he was appointed Fire Chief for the Town of Athol. Following his experience in Athol, in 2011, he accepted the Fire Chief position for the Town of Sharon and retired in March 2023. After retiring, he served as Interim Chief for the Town of Norwood for four months. After a year of retirement, he found a job posting for the Town of Dover Fire Department. He is excited to utilize his knowledge and experience to support the department's development and success.

Conservation Commission

To maintain a beautiful lawn and support a healthy ecosystem while protecting Dover's land and water, homeowners should discuss environmentally friendly lawn care options with contractors.



Here are some eco-friendly lawn care tips:

FERTILIZE NATURALLY: Remember to use organic and slow-release fertilizers for healthy soil and grass growth. Avoid synthetic fertilizers as they can harm the environment. Organic fertilizers are easy to apply and come in liquid and slow-release granular types. Applying them in the fall prepares the soil for new growth in the spring, maintaining important soil nutrients and reducing the need for additional chemicals.

CLEAN-UP RESPONSIBLY: When cleaning up your yard, avoid blowing or raking leaves into the street where they can clog storm drains and catch basins, which can lead to water pollution and cause flooding.

COMPOST LEAVES: Consider composting shredded leaves instead of disposing of them in a landfill. You can bring them to the leaf compost area at the Dover Transfer Station or purchase compost bins from various locations. Contact the DPW at 508-785-0058, ext. 110 before purchasing to check availability. You can also make your own compost bin by visiting <https://www.sunset.com/garden/backyard-projects/build-perfect-compost-bin>.

OVERSEED: Overseeding your lawn in the fall can help thicken it and fill in bare spots. Thicker grass leaves less room for weeds and eliminates the need for herbicides. Choose native or drought-resistant grass species that require less water and maintenance.

USE MANUAL TOOLS: Consider using a rake instead of a leaf blower to gather leaves, as leaf blowers are noisy and produce significant greenhouse gas emissions. Edmunds estimated that some gas leaf blowers generate 23 times the carbon dioxide of a Ford F-150 Raptor truck and 300 times more non-methane hydrocarbons.

PLANT NATIVE TREES AND SHRUBS: Fall is a great time to plant native trees and shrubs until the first frost. They require less maintenance and provide habitat for local wildlife. The Native Plant Trust/Garden in the Woods in Framingham provides extensive information on native plants and how to convert your lawn into a native landscape, as well as how to avoid and manage invasive plants. Dover Planning Board Seeks Associate Member


The Dover Planning Board is looking for an associate member.

The Planning Board uses bylaws and regulations to address short and long term issues facing Dover. It is currently working with the Dover Housing Taskforce to develop a toolbox of options for housing (see <https://www.doverma.gov/667/Land-Use-Housing-Development>); providing input on Ch. 4OB affordable housing applications; developing a bylaw to meet the legal requirements of the MBTA Communities Act for zoning of multifamily housing; writing regulations to revitalize and protect Dover's village center; and addressing the impacts of development on stormwater management, tree removal and Dover's open space priorities. Next year, we will be updating the 2012 Dover Master Plan through a community engagement process.

During the last several years we have proposed and the Town has passed bylaws addressing construction noise, accessory dwelling units, solar array construction and floodplain protection.
