# Planning Board

## MBTA Communities Act

In 2021, the Massachusetts legislature passed a law (the MBTA Communities Act) that requires that the 177 municipalities in the MBTA's service area (including Dover) have at least one zoning district of reasonable size in which multi-family housing (housing with at least 3 units on one piece of property) is permitted as of right. Even though Dover doesn't have MBTA services within its borders, because it abuts a town that does provide services, it has been deemed to be an "Adjacent Small Town" and so must comply with the law by December 31, 2025.

### **It's important to note that the MBTA Communities Act law:**

- Does NOT require that multi-family housing be built
- Does NOT compel Dover to pay for or approve new infrastructure like sewer or water
- Does NOT supersede or override Dover wetlands or Title V laws or any of Dover's general bylaws or regulations.
- The law DOES allow Dover to maintain control of future development in the proposed district through our local regulations and bylaws and allows us to develop specific zoning regulations for any proposed MBTA multi-family district, such as screening, setbacks, and dimensional requirements.

### **Here are some of the ways you can get involved in the coming weeks and months:**

- Town Website: Check the [MBTA Communities Multi-family Zoning webpage](#) regularly for updates, resources, FAQs and information on upcoming meetings. This will be an important source for official announcements and documents related to the compliance process.
- Newsletters and Notifications: Subscribe to town newsletters or notifications to receive updates directly in your inbox.
- Social Media and Local News: Follow local social media channels or news outlets that cover town meetings and planning board activities for real-time updates and discussions surrounding the MBTA Communities Act compliance efforts.
- Community Outreach Events: Participate in community workshops and public hearings planned by the Planning Board. These events are designed to gather input from residents and provide information about the compliance requirements and proposed zoning changes.
- Planning Board: Watch the Planning Board's agendas in the coming months and join in the ongoing compliance conversations to make your voice heard. You can also reach out directly to the Planning Board with your comments, ideas or feedback.

**Special Town Meeting:** Attend the special town meeting that we will be scheduled for September 2025, at which residents will have the opportunity to debate and vote on the proposed bylaw.

# Planning Board (Continued)

## Here's what you can expect in 2025:

The Planning Board will lead a process to select a location (or locations) for a proposed overlay district where multi-family housing would be allowed by-right and to draft a new proposed zoning bylaw to comply with the MBTA Communities Act.

Over the next few months, we'll be holding public workshops and meetings to gather your input and feedback.

Both the proposed bylaw and the proposed overlay district will be brought to a vote at a special Town Meeting in September 2025.

# Department of Public Works

The Willow Street culvert project has successfully reached its conclusion after a comprehensive and meticulous construction process. In December, the project reached its final phase with the completion of guardrail installation along the adjacent road section. These guardrails not only ensure the safety of motorists but also complement the functionality of the newly constructed culvert. With this final step finished, the entire project is now officially complete, signifying a significant upgrade to the infrastructure of Willow Street and providing lasting benefits to the community..



## Eversource

As part of our ongoing commitment to deliver reliable energy and superior service to our customers, we are proposing replacement of an existing 115-kilovolt (kV) transmission line in the Dover, Needham and Westwood area. The cable was installed in 1967 and is nearing the end of its design life expectancy. The existing high pressure fluid filled (HPFF) transmission line will be replaced with solid dielectric cross-linked polyethylene (XLPE) cables. The proposed transmission system improvements proactively increase system reliability by:

- Proactively addressing any issues with obtaining supplies and upgrading system technology with longer life expectancy
- Reducing occurrence of unplanned outages that may require the need for emergency replacement or repair
- Eliminating the risk of oil leaks from existing HPFF cables
- Potentially increasing line capacity for future load growth

The proposed project is part of our larger Underground Cable Modernization Program that we are conducting throughout our service territory in Connecticut and Massachusetts. Additionally, the project website has gone live for the public to visit and receive ongoing updates as the project progresses. Please join us for a guided walk, sponsored by the Dover Open Space Committee (OSC). On January 11th, we will walk through Dover's town-owned conservation land on Snow Hill and into the Dover Land Conservation Trust's Snow Hill Reservation. This walk will be more rigorous than our usual walks. It will be over uneven and possibly wet & slippery ground so wear appropriate footwear. ## Tree Preservation Committee

Are you thinking about cutting trees on your property? The Town of Dover frequently receives calls concerned about tree removal and the impact on abutting properties. It is strongly encouraged that before removing trees, you first verify whether tree-related bylaws impact your property.

# Recycling Committee

The Dover Recycling Committee (DRC) announces guidelines for recycling during the holiday season to encourage residents to continue to reduce, reuse, recycle, and conserve town funds.

## **RECYCLE – DO NOT THROW IN THE TRASH**

- **CHRISTMAS TREES, WREATHS, AND PLANTS:** Strip all ornaments, tinsel, and wires and deposit in the yard waste section of the Transfer Station.
- **FOOD WASTE:** Bag all food waste including turkey carcasses, egg shells, all bones, fruits, and vegetables, and deposit in the Food Waste barrels at the Transfer Station.
- **HOLIDAY STRING LIGHTS (TANGLERS):** Place in the metals bin at the Transfer Station. These are a **HUGE** contamination hazard in the recycling stream.
- **CARDBOARD BOXES:** Break down and flatten all boxes and remove plastic liners and Styrofoam. Include greasy pizza boxes.
- **REFUNDABLE BOTTLES AND CANS:** Place in the barrels at the deposit trailer.
- **TEXTILES:** Bag dry textiles (old clothes, shoes, bedding, etc.) in any condition and place them in the textile bins at the Transfer Station or the Middle and High Schools.
- **BATTERIES:** Non-alkaline and button batteries should be given to the Transfer Station personnel.

## **THROW IN THE TRASH**

- **WRAPPING PAPER:** DO NOT THROW IT IN THE MIXED PAPER TRAILER. It goes in the regular trash since it is chemically treated with fire retardant and cannot be recycled.
- **PLASTIC LINERS:** Throw in the trash.
- **BLACK PLASTIC:** Throw in the trash.
- **WAXED CARDBOARD:** Milk, juice, soup cartons-throw in the trash.
- **ALKALINE BATTERIES:** Throw in the trash.

## **FURNITURE COLLECTIONS**

Did you get some new “stuff” for the holidays and now have duplicates? Do you have too many small kitchen appliances, dishes, glasses, utensils, towels, sheets, etc.? Don’t throw them out – Donate them.

The Dover Recycling Committee partners with New Life Furniture Bank (NLFB) of Walpole to provide furniture collections on the third Saturday of every month at the Transfer Station. NLFB, a non-profit organization accepts specific items of furniture and household goods for families making a fresh start in a new apartment.

NLFB is a non-profit organization offers these items at no charge to those in need. It does not accept items that need repair. If an item is not suitable for a family member or friend, it is not suitable for donation. Please check their website for acceptable items

## STYROFOAM SPECIAL RECYCLING COLLECTION

### JANUARY 11 DOVER TRANSFER STATION

Please bring appropriate types of foam (it must SNAP when bent...expanded polystyrene) in CLEAR or WHITE leaf or trash bags.

#### BRING THESE FOR RECYCLING:

- Packing foam-used to ship electronics, appliances, etc..
- Foam coolers
- Foam egg cartons
- Foam food trays and cups- must be rinsed, clean, and dry.

All items must be Clean and Dry, No Labels, Tape or Glue



#### NOT ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- Foam wrapping sheets
- Foam urethane- spongy packing material: i.e. mattress toppers
- Pluck foam- spongy, ridged packing material: may be used in mattress toppers
- Packing peanuts


### FREE COVID-19 Test Kit Availability

### Ticks are Everywhere, Even in the Winter!

The Board of Health reminds residents to be mindful of ticks when going outdoors. Ticks survive through the winter, though they are inactive when temperatures fall below freezing. Ticks are common in forests, backyards, school yards, parks, and can be more prevalent during certain outdoor activities. Be sure to dress for protection, apply tick repellent, and check yourself and others (including pets) after spending time outdoors.

# Conservation Commission

## **Conservation Commission Seeks Property Owners For a FREE Wetlands Buffer Planting Program**

Do you live along the Charles River or a perennial stream? If so, the Conservation Commission would like to help you improve wildlife habitat and protect your property and our water resources. The Commission is seeking interested property owners to participate in a FREE pilot program to expand natural vegetative buffers along perennial streams and rivers in Dover.

The Commission is working on this project with other communities in the area through a State-funded grant to improve protection of sensitive wetland buffer areas and water quality. By planting native trees and shrubs along waterways, we reduce flooding impact and increase our climate resiliency. This program is designed to assist homeowners in creating a streamside buffer of native trees and shrubs. A streamside buffer creates habitat for wildlife, moderates peak summer temperatures, and reduces the amount of sediment, fertilizer and toxic materials that enter our waterways. Deep-rooted trees and shrubs can also stabilize streambanks, protecting them from erosion. Plus, it can look beautiful and keep your property from washing downstream!

Each selected property will be provided with a FREE bundle of native shrubs and tree saplings, seed mix for groundcover and erosion controls and temporary fencing, if needed. Planting bundles will be distributed for planting in the spring of 2025 and pilot properties will be monitored in cooperation with the Commission through the fall/winter of 2025. Depending on need and grant funding awarded, installation costs may be covered by the program.

The Conservation Commission is charged with protecting and preserving the Town's wetlands, natural resources and open space.
