# Special Town Meeting

## Special Town Meeting passes the MBTA Communities Act Bylaw.

At the September 29th Special Town Meeting, voters passed a new Zoning Bylaw Ch. 185-50 and Overlay District by a vote of **250 in Favor** and **29 opposed**.

This favorable Town Meeting vote will enable Dover to submit a District Compliance Application to the Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communities. The application is due by **December 31, 2025**, in order for Dover to remain eligible for millions of dollars of annual and one-time state grants.

The Planning Board thanks Dover's voters and the team of local government volunteers and Town staff that supported our efforts over the past 3 years.

# Fire Department

## Halloween Safety Tips

### Decorations

- Pumpkin carving is the leading cause of Halloween injuries. Leave it to adults. Use carving tools rather than kitchen knives.
- Use glow sticks or battery candles instead of open flames in pumpkins
- Keep scarecrows, cornstalks, and hay bales away from doors, stairs, and windows. Keep exits clear.
- Keep flammable decorations away from heat sources.



### Costumes

- Children should carry a flashlight, and costumes should be bright-colored or have reflective tape to highlight them.
- Be sure all parts of the costume are labeled flame-retardant.
- Costumes should not have trailing material or tails long enough to trip on.
- Pointed objects such as swords and pitchforks should be made of soft material.
- Be sure your child can see clearly if they wear a mask.

### Trick or Treating

- Young children should always trick-or-treat with an adult and head out early. For older kids going alone, review the ground rules first.
- Know what neighborhoods they will be in.
- Don't allow them in areas with which you are not completely comfortable.
- Have the children stay in a group.
- Let them know what time to be home.
- Give them a cell phone to use if necessary.
- Use sidewalks and cover one side of the street at a time.
- Cross only at the corners, never dart out between parked cars.
- Never accept a ride in a car or go inside a home unless it is a friend.
- Only approach houses where the outside lights are on, as a signal of welcome.
- Bring bags home to be checked by an adult before eating a single treat.

## Dover Librarian Nancy Tegeler Retires



## Historical Society

### Do You Believe?

The Dover Demon is one of Massachusetts' most intriguing and enduring mysteries, capturing the imagination of residents and visitors alike. The creature was first reported in April 1977 when several high schoolers claimed to have encountered a strange, eerie figure late in the night in wooded areas close in proximity to each other. Described as a small, hairless creature with glowing eyes and long, spindly limbs, the Dover Demon's appearance and obscure nature have kept it at the center of local folklore for decades.

The incident sparked widespread curiosity and speculation, with many questioning what the teens saw that night. Some believed it was an alien entity, while others thought it might have been a rare animal or a bizarre hoax. Over the years, investigators and enthusiasts have looked into the sightings, collecting firsthand accounts and examining the evidence. Its story has inspired numerous authors and artists who find the creature's strange appearance and unexplained origins captivating. The Dover Demon has become a symbol of the unknown and the unexplained paradoxes that lurk just beyond our understanding.

Every spring, when the third graders from Chickering Elementary School visit the Dover Historical Society, the question about the Dover Demon is always the same—they ask what happened and if the creature was real. It's a story that sparks their curiosity and imagination, making it a favorite part of their visit.

The Dover Historical Society is excited to announce a temporary exhibit "The Dover Demon: Uncovering a Local Legend," on display through the end of the year. Featuring a comprehensive look at the investigation, including photographs, newspaper articles from the time, and detailed descriptions of the sightings, the exhibit aims to shed light on the story's historical context and the enduring curiosity it continues to inspire. Visitors will have the chance to explore firsthand witness accounts from those who encountered the creature, giving a vivid perspective on that extraordinary night.

This upcoming exhibit will provide a fun and educational opportunity for visitors of all ages to delve into a true local legend that has captivated the community for over four decades. The Sawin Museum, located at 80 Dedham Street in Dover Center, will be open on the second Saturday of October, November and December from 1pm to 4pm. ## Board of Appeals

The Board of Appeals is presently considering an application for a Comprehensive permit under State law Ch. 40B to construct 42 apartment units (11 affordable) on a 5.1-acre parcel behind the County Court community. The hearing has been extended so that the proposed plans of the Developer, not yet finalized, meet the standards of the engineering consultants employed by the Board (at Developer expense). Although scheduled to conclude on October 30, the hearing will be extended further and possibly into 2026. A public session of the hearing will be scheduled after the Board's consultants are in agreement that the plans are ready for Board review. A site walk will also be scheduled.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, the Board is allowed 40 days under State law to deliberate and decide whether to approve a comprehensive permit. Any such permit, if granted, would not permit construction without demonstration of an adequate public water supply, access to Tisdale Drive, and such other conditions as the Board determines are desirable and not contrary to Chapter 40B.

### **A Peaceful New Chapter at Highland Cemetery**

Did you know that over 80% of burials at Highland Cemetery are now cremations? With this profound shift in how we honor our loved ones—and with cemetery expansion limited by the surrounding forest—the Cemetery Commission thoughtfully chose a path forward that balances tradition, community need, and environmental stewardship. The result is the creation of our beautiful new columbariums and garden.

The word columbarium finds its roots in the Latin columba, meaning dove—a symbol of peace. Historically used to describe structures that housed doves, the term now refers to a dignified and simple structure for the interment of cremated remains. This new space, thoughtfully designed and built with care, is more than a final resting place. It is a serene setting for remembrance and quiet reflection—an enduring tribute to those who came before us.

This project, shaped by a deep respect for the land and our community's evolving needs, enhances both the beauty and function of Highland Cemetery. It invites us all to pause, remember, and find peace amidst nature and memory.



### Upcoming Events:

The Fall Special Recycling Day will be held at the Transfer Station on **Saturday, October 18th**. Once again, we'll be collecting items noted below for several non-profit organizations and offering on-site shredding from **9-12**.

- Bikes in good condition for The Bike Connector
- Wheeled suitcases, backpacks, and duffel bags for Generic Ministries
- Monthly collection of furniture and household goods for New Life Furniture Bank

We will also be collecting clothing to benefit Boston's homeless, served through Generic Ministries. High need items include winter clothing, sneakers, jeans, sweatpants, and hoodies for both men and women. A separate bin will be set up next to the standing Bay State bins for these items.

And don't forget our permanent collection bins in the swap shop for tennis ball recycling, clean reusable shopping bags for A Place to Turn, and string lights, in addition to our regular textile collection stations, accepting clean, bagged clothing, linens, shoes, and other textiles.

**Did you know? Not all glass is recyclable.**

DO recycle glass bottles and jars, emptying out any liquid or food residue first.

DO NOT put things like mirrors, window panes, drinking glasses, glass dishes, and vases in the glass recycling bin. These have different melting points than glass bottles and jars, so they can't be processed together. Broken glass is also a no-go – it's a safety hazard. Put these items in the trash. A RecycleSmartMA tip!
